

Hidden Places Most Travelers Miss

When you think of the Costa del Sol, you probably imagine bustling beaches, glamorous resorts, and all-day sunshine. And while those are certainly part of the charm, there's another side to this coastal paradise—one filled with secret spots, breathtaking views, and a touch of adventure. Whether you're a first-time visitor or have been to Spain's southern coast a dozen times, these five hidden gems will show you the Costa del Sol like you've never seen it before.



1-Benalmádena Pueblo

Let's start with Benalmádena Pueblo, a serene hilltop village that feels like a world away from the touristy buzz of Benalmádena Costa below. This whitewashed Andalusian town is the definition of peaceful, with cobbled streets, traditional homes draped in flower pots, and locals enjoying life at a slower pace.

Begin your morning at Plaza de España, where you can sip café con leche under the shade of orange trees and browse artisan shops. Visit Santo Domingo Church and the nearby Buddhist temple, two landmarks that reflect the area's diverse spirit. Don't forget to explore El Muro Gardens, offering one of the best panoramic views of the coastline.

Whether you're visiting during a lively village festival or enjoying the quiet magic of spring, Benalmádena Pueblo delivers an authentic Andalusian experience with postcard-perfect charm.



2-Castillo de Colomares

Tucked just minutes away from Benalmádena Pueblo is one of the Costa del Sol's most whimsical secrets: Castillo de Colomares. If you're thinking "a castle? In southern Spain?"—Yes, but this one's different. Built between 1987 and 1994 by a local doctor with a passion for history and architecture, this monument celebrates the life and voyages of Christopher Columbus.

What makes Colomares truly special is its design. It blends Gothic, Byzantine, Romanesque, and Moorish styles into something that feels more like a movie set than a real building. There are towers, fountains, hidden nooks, and incredible details carved into nearly every inch of stone.

It's not a massive castle, but it's packed with personality and perfect for photos, quiet moments, or simply standing still and letting your imagination wander. Best of all? It's rarely crowded.



3-El Torcal de Antequera (A Landscape from Another Planet)

Drive just over an hour inland from the coast and you'll arrive at El Torcal de Antequera, one of Spain's most surreal natural wonders. Here, limestone rock formations, shaped by millions of years of erosion, create a dreamlike landscape that looks like it belongs on another planet.

Towering stone stacks, narrow passageways, and hidden caves make this a playground for hikers, photographers, and anyone with a love for nature. There are several well-marked trails—some short and family-friendly, others a bit more challenging—but all of them offer stunning scenery and the chance to spot wildlife like ibex, vultures, and wild orchids.

There's also a visitor center with maps and snacks, but the real joy is simply getting lost (safely!) among the rocks and marveling at nature's wild creativity. If you've had your fill of beaches, El Torcal is the perfect inland escape.



4-La Concha (The Iconic Mountain Above Marbella)

Rising above Marbella like a silent guardian is La Concha, the mountain that shapes the skyline and offers one of the most rewarding hikes on the Costa del Sol. While the beaches below are packed with sunbathers, very few venture up to experience the breathtaking panoramic views that this iconic peak offers.

At 1,215 meters high, La Concha isn't a casual stroll—but it's also not just for expert hikers. With the right shoes, some water, and a bit of determination, the climb is doable and well worth it. On a clear day, you can see across the Costa del Sol, out to the Mediterranean, and even as far as the coast of Africa.

Along the trail, you'll pass through pine forests, rocky outcrops, and wild terrain, all while breathing in some of the freshest air around. It's a beautiful reminder that the Costa del Sol isn't just about sea level—you can find peace and perspective high above the buzz, too.



5-Cueva del Tesoro (A Sea Cave Full of Legends)

Last but not least, let's venture underground to one of the only known sea caves in Europe that is also open to the public: Cueva del Tesoro, located in the quiet town of Rincón de la Victoria, just outside Málaga. What makes this cave special—aside from its striking beauty—is its mix of natural wonder and mysterious history. Formed by the sea over millions of years, the cave features winding tunnels, underground chambers, and even ancient carvings left behind by prehistoric civilizations.

And of course, there's the legend: rumor has it that an Arab treasure is still hidden somewhere within these stone walls, earning the cave its name ("Cave of Treasure"). Whether or not you find gold, the experience itself is a treasure—cool, quiet, and filled with a sense of timelessness. It's an ideal place to explore with family or on a peaceful solo outing, especially during hot summer afternoons when the cave's natural chill is more than welcome.
